Saraswati Samman for Manoj Das

The New Millennium has dawned with another good news for us—Manoj-da has also been awarded 'Padmashree' this year.

The Saraswati Samman, the most prestigious literary award in the country, has been conferred for the year 2000 on Oriya novelist Manoj Das for his novel Amrita Phula.

The award is given annually to an outstanding literary work in any Indian language by an Indian citizen which has been published in the last 10 years preceding the year for which the Samman is awarded.

The award is also distinguished by an elaborate selection process. It is done by a high level "Chayan Parishad" presided over by former Supreme Court Judge Justice H.R. Khanna. Works published in 18 Indian languages during the period 1990-1999 were considered before Manoj Das was finally chosen for the honour.

Born in Orissa in 1934, Das has several literary contributions to his credit in many genres. His first collection of poems was published in 1949. His first collection of short stories was published two years later. However, fiction-writing has emerged as his main medium of expression. He has 33 published books to his credit. Das is also recongnised today as a bilingual writer of eminence, having written both in English and Oriya. Ever since moving to the Sri Aurobindo Ashram, Pondicherry in 1963, Das has been a professor of English literature at the Sri Aurobindo International Centre of Education.

The award-winning novel was published in 1996. It deals with how much man today differs from his ancestors in his primeval longing for truth, light, bliss and immortality. The search for an answer to the question comprises the theme of the work.

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
